### APHC PRESIDENT'S DINNER- SATURDAY 30 JUNE 2018

Graham Beevers has been elected as President of the Association of Plumbing and Heating Contractors for a second time (his first term of office was in 2008/09) and he has invited me to be the principal speaker at the Dinner which takes place at the Rookery Hall Spa and Hotel in Nantwich, Cheshire.



I have been asked to speak about apprenticeships and this gives me the opportunity to link the Livery Company's long history of involvement with apprentices to today's developments, including the introduction of Trailblazer apprenticeships for plumbing in England and Wales (with Level 3 NVQ having been chosen as the end qualification). Entertainment is provided by baritone Sam Carl and his accompanist Collin Shay, both students at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama and I am delighted when their repertoire includes Ae Fond Kiss, A Man's a Man for A' That and My Love is Like a Red Red Rose (all Scottish songs).

We return home pleased with what seems to have been a very enjoyable and relaxing evening.

### JAILED AND BAILED- FRIDAY 6 JULY 2018
