

WELCOME TO THE NEW MASTER — ROBERT BURGON

It is an enormous honour to have been elected as Master of this great and historic Livery Company.

Having worked for almost 40 years in plumbing industry organisations, I have always held the Worshipful Company of Plumbers in high regard. It has a history of service going back at least 652 years and yet in 2017, it still has a real and meaningful relevance in supporting the industry, the City of London and charitable activities. I hope to play a small part in the continuing development of our Company in the 21st century while maintaining the important links to the past six and a half centuries.

My hopes for the year ahead

My principal goal during the coming year will be to see more of our Liverymen becoming involved in the Company's activities. "Involvement" can mean many things, ranging from activity in the Court and Committees, attendance at our significant events such as the Annual Lecture and Annual Banquet or participation in one of the social visits which are arranged. Following our membership survey in 2016 when we asked Liverymen what they wanted from their Company, several actions have been implemented and we have already seen a number of people becoming more actively involved. We have appointed a Company Almoner and new Trustees have been appointed to the Company's Charitable and Education Trust. At the Installation Court three new Court Assistants were welcomed.

This is all extremely encouraging and augurs well for our future. However, there is no room for complacency and I hope to see further engagement of more Liverymen in the year ahead. There is also a need to continue to grow our Livery and I commend to you the recent appeal from the Immediate Past Master to help in achieving our recruitment targets over the next two years. I also look forward to the continuing development of our Corporate Membership scheme which was launched in early 2017 and provides excellent links between the Company and major organisations operating in the industry.

Looking ahead, we have planned a reception for recent Liverymen, another bursaries presentation event at Cannon Street Station (close to World Plumbing Day which is celebrated every year on 11 March) and a varied and hopefully interesting programme of visits both in London and further afield. There are many events open to all Liverymen during the year and I encourage you all to consider which you can support. I particularly look forward to welcoming members of the Company and partners to the Master's Weekend in Edinburgh from 14–16 September 2018.

I am privileged to have the support and considerable experience of Dame Fiona Woolf as Upper Warden and Dr Peter Rumley as Renter Warden. Senior Steward Ian Smith leads an excellent team of Stewards who play a crucial role in the smooth running of Company events.

OUR CHARITABLE WORK

Our charitable work strives to change lives for the better.

Our charitable activities concentrate on plumbing related projects, helping trainee plumbers and supporting historic Lead craft work.

We also cooperate with other charities in supporting plumbing and sanitary projects in other countries.

In recognition of being in the City of London it also supports the Lord Mayor's charities and educational activities within or related to the City.

The Plumbing Museum and Workshop

The Company actively supports historic plumbing museums and a workshop with a Lead craft demonstration facility.

It has been a busy year for our volunteers at the workshop in Sussex because the Lead craft demonstration facility is moving to a new workshop at the Amberley Working Museum near Arundel.

The Company originally set up the workshop in 1980 at the Weald and Downland Museum at Singleton with the demonstration facility and a collection of plumbing tools and aims to tell school children and the public more about water supply and disposal through the centuries. The workshop is also used as an educational facility to train individuals in historic Lead craftwork.

The volunteers at the workshop have made many items in Lead over the years but Lead planters have been particularly popular with commemorative planters helping to raise the profile of the Lead craftwork and also funds for our charity.

Lead planters that have been made at the workshop now stand in the gardens at Buckingham Palace, Sandringham and the Guildhall. This year we presented Honorary Liveryman, Her Royal Highness The Duchess of Cornwall, with a Lead planter to commemorate her 70th birthday.

Medical Detection Dogs

Medical Detection Dogs uses the amazing power of the dog's nose to detect human diseases. We are pleased to support the charity Medical Detection Dogs whose research is based on the dog's ability to detect minute odour traces created by diseases.



Village by Village

For the past three years we have been delighted to support the work of the small charity 'Village by Village' who work with children and their families in poor, rural communities in Ghana.

By providing inexpensive sanitation facilities and importantly, education in basic hygiene, 'Village by Village' dramatically reduces child mortality.

Simple hygiene improvements are life saving. For a donation of just £5,000 a year our Company sponsors a village-based project, extending this life-saving programme to another 200 or 300 children and their families.

Not only are drinking water and sewage facilities built but also essential training on the maintenance of the facilities and education on basic hygiene is provided.

The Plumbers are proud to partake in this exciting and worthwhile work — the hygiene and sanitation focus of this programme makes it a brilliant 'fit' for our charitable activities.


Freedom and Livery Committee

The Freedom and Livery Committee comprises entirely of Court members and is always chaired by a Past Master. It focuses on the longer-term strategy of the Company, its health, standards, protocols and communications.

The Court membership and succession was reviewed at the beginning of the Livery year with discussions aimed at ensuring a smooth transition through the offices of Wardens and Master for the next eight years. The guidelines for all office holders was also brought up to date.

The major event calendar was reviewed to further assist their smooth running and to maximise Liverymen's opportunities to attend. The main change was to run a Summer Festival in July in place of the Autumn Festival and give the Ladle Dinner more prominence.

2017 has seen a major review of the Company website and the associated office event booking and notification systems. Intensive work on the new site followed a review of potential suppliers. The result will be a much improved website experience for all users particularly Liverymen and our hard working Webmasters, Past Master Rodney Cartwright, Assistant Paul Nash and Steward Damon Reynolds. The new website will begin rollout in the spring of 2018 supported by the latest technology.



Technical Committee

Company Lecture 2017

The all-important Company Lecture 2017, held at the Royal College of Physicians, was given by Marcus Rink, Chief Inspector of Drinking Water Inspectorate for England and Wales.

Marcus set the scene by giving an overview of the world situation in respect of the availability of treated drinking water. Despite recent improvements worldwide, 1 in 10 or 663 million people still do not have access to improved water. Even improved water may still contain harmful bacteria.

The UK position and in particular private water supplies represent no more than 1% of the population of England and Wales,

their water is not regulated in the same way, and they are at higher risk of problems, although regulated water companies provide a safe supply.

The Company Lecture continues to be one of the principal events in the annual calendar.

Water Safe

Past Master Chris Sneath, Chairman of WaterSafe, has had a challenging year for WaterSafe. 2017 has been a strengthening year both in terms of new member businesses and wider recognition from the general public. There has been acceptance by all members to aspire to increasing the minimum standard level of training to NVQ level 3 and collective support from Water Companies and Approved Contractor Associations to actively seek mandatory registration for its members. The industry is changing with the introduction of new technologies and higher standards and these need the protection of competent, skilled and qualified tradespersons.

The industry at large

The Company continues to forge relationships with industry through the CIPHE, SNIPEF, BPEC and the All Party Parliamentary Water Group.

Singleton

The Company is fully committed to its foundation craft of leadwork, conservation and heritage. 2017 witnessed changes at Singleton where the Company has had a long relationship. Past Master Edward Hopkinson successfully negotiated a move of The Plumbing Museum and Workshop Trust's demonstration facility from Singleton to Amberley Museum & Heritage Center for an opening in April 2018.

Blists Hill

The Company has a strong interest in maintaining a relationship with manning the Plumber's Workshop at Ironbridge Heritage Museum and to assist with demonstrations.



This year was our 33rd Annual Lecture, held at the Royal College of Physician it brought together a good cross-section of the industry to hear about whether we take our water quality for granted.

Education Committee

Education Committee Review

A review took place regarding the remit, responsibilities and objects of the Education Committee and it was agreed to focus attention on bursaries, education & training. The bursary application form and promotional leaflet have been updated and promoted to colleges and training centres and during Corporate Members' lunches. The criteria for the Gold and Silver Awards has been reviewed.

Promotion and support

The Education Committee's activities have been promoted during 16 college visits, through social media and within CIPHE's ETM magazine. The EC also supports the work undertaken by the APHC, CIPHE and industry employers in developing the Plumbing & Domestic Heating Technician Apprenticeship (Trailblazer).

In association with the CIPHE a career pathway flowchart has been developed. It has been received favourably by the plumbing industry and acclaimed by other Livery companies.



This year, the winning college was New College Durham and the winning student was Stewart Brown with Michael Lynn as the runner-up.

The Master presented the Company's Gold Medal to Mr Daniel (Dan) Martins, who is 20 years old. He has won several national contests against strong competition to secure his place as the UK's representative at the Plumbing WorldSkills 2017 competition on 14-19 October in Abu Dhabi (UAE).

It was clear that there is a growing need for skilled plumbers and the College is doing its best to provide them.

Four students from Croydon College were presented with a voucher for £1000 each on 19th April at the ceremony that took place at the Plumbers' Statue. The vouchers were kindly sponsored by Monument

OBITUARY: PAST MASTER JACK JEFFREY

Jack Jeffery was a chemist and water purity expert; he did his national service in the RAF and in 1950 read chemistry and bacteriology at what is now Newcastle University.

His first job was with the National Coal Board as a chemist. He chaired the Water Companies Association and became well known internationally in the field of water quality.

Jack became Master of the Company in 1995 and was appointed CBE the same year. He was chair of the World Humanity Action Trust in 2000, and vice-chair of the British Humanist Association

and chaired the International Humanist Conference in Uganda in 2009.

He is survived by Gillian, three daughters and four grandchildren.
