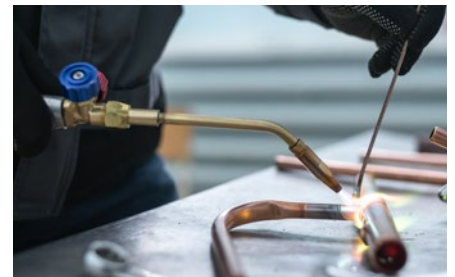
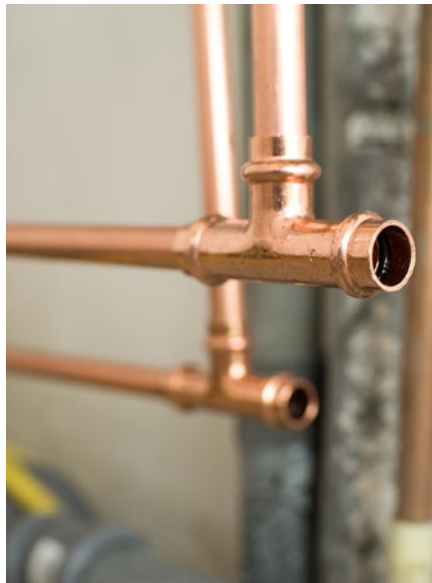
CRASH help homelessness charities and hospices with vital construction projects, creating places that care for people.

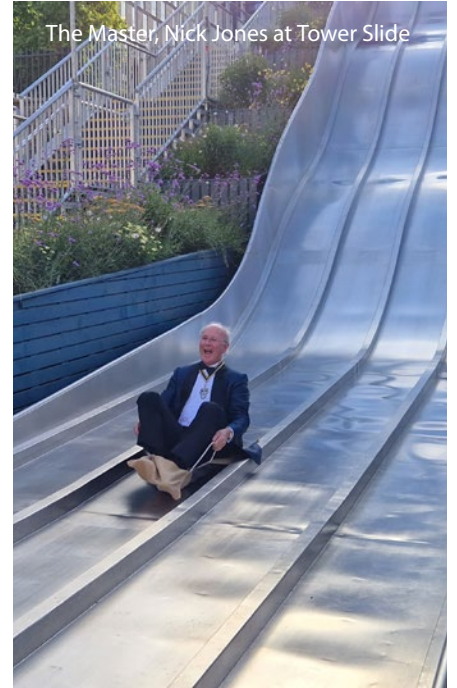

FREEDOM AND LIVERY COMMITTEE

During the period the Freedom and Livery Committee undertook several of its annual duties to maintain our standards and protocols.

The risk registers of all the committees were reviewed and a summary produced for the Company. Actions to mitigate these were then set in place. Subsequently a full review of the process and protocols surrounding the appointment of our Stewards by Upper Warden Paul Nash took place and will be implemented in the ensuing year.

The annual meeting of Committee Chairs ensured that committee membership was refreshed and that actions were coordinated across each.

The Court succession was reviewed, with annual reviews noted where necessary. A new Court Assistant Mr Damon Reynolds was appointed to join the Court in October, Mr Reynolds is currently senior steward.

The Committee reviewed in detail the proposed new Apprenticeship Scheme

from the Membership Committee; a joint endeavour with the CIPHE. This was developed further, together with a budget and proposed to the Court which was accepted.

The Communication sub-group met to ensure that our corporate brand and communication media were to brief. A new Company LinkedIn account was opened, aimed primarily at the business end of our membership, particularly corporate members. Our website was reviewed under its new webmaster Steward Philippa Stary, with renewed profile given to our charity at Amberley. The new 'Join Us' film was also included reflecting the drive for a more diverse membership.

For centuries our 'Oath' sworn by all new Liverymen as they enter the Livery has stood unaltered. Still written in old English, it has

stood the test of time, however following a review by Upper Warden Paul Nash, it was agreed that one small change was necessary. The Court subsequently agreed to make it gender neutral, aligning with many other City institutions.

It was proposed and subsequently agreed by the Court that a planter should be presented to Her Majesty the Queen to commemorate her Platinum Jubilee. Following approval from Her Majesty, arrangements were made to locate the new planter at Windsor Castle on a prominent site at the Royal Household Cricket Club. (RHCC). The team at Amberley led by Liveryman Peter Cheesman produced the planter within a very tight timescale and installed it in June.

It was planted up by the Royal Gardeners and looked magnificent in July for a visit from Her Majesty to the RHCC. Past Master Nick Gale on behalf of the Company had the privilege of presenting it to Her Majesty and reflecting on the other Jubilee planters sited at Buckingham Palace and Sandringham.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE – GROWTH FOR FOR TODAY AND TOMORROW

2022 was an active year for the Membership Committee with continued focus on initiatives for the appointment and retention of a healthy and diverse supply-line of new Liverymen.

The Company was pleased to clothe 14 new liverymen in 2022, a creditable achievement in our first post-Covid year.

The successful launch of the 'Integrate New Liverymen' scheme saw a significant number of experienced Liverymen become 'Hosts' to take care of recently appointed Liverymen as they attended their opening Plumbers events such as the annual banquet. This helped them feel welcome and well placed to make new friendships and contacts within the Plumbers community. This scheme is helping our new members commit to the Company and making them ready to themselves bring new members into the Plumbers.

A revamped 'Social-Induction' programme is designed and ready for use for the first time since before Covid. Liverymen who have joined in the previous 2 years are invited to a short, informal evening event to meet the Master and Wardens for an interactive session. This is a friendly opportunity to learn about new Liverymen's experience of the Company, to provide a deeper understanding of its workings, to highlight areas where Liverymen may actively contribute, and to guide them on sponsoring new members.

The Women in the Livery (WIL) group was proactive over the year as we strive to increase the diversity of our membership and make all types of people welcome. Notable highlights were (a) the production of a 90-second 'Join Us' video to promote recruitment through short, upbeat, clips of a wide range of Liverymen; it was greeted most positively and is available to support us all in our work to build the Company; (b) the 'Not All Plain Sailing' webinar on diversity and recruitment was expertly led by 2 senior women from The Royal Navy (a Commodore and a Commander); they spoke about recruitment, progression, and retention of women in the Navy and how to maximise an organisation's potential as its membership changes.

The project to create a new category of apprentice member for young people in the plumbing and heating industry, progressed well. The scheme will see the Company actively cooperate with the CIPHE to provide a range of educational and social opportunities that will positively engage up to 50 award-winning young tradespeople, recruited over 5 years, and provide them also with membership benefits in both WCP and CIPHE. We are now working closely with colleagues at CIPHE to bring the scheme to fruition.

The Corporate Membership category has become a vital part of the Company's structure and appeal. Whilst the post-Covid period has been challenging, we have retained a strong core membership group and continue to offer executives of member companies a unique opportunity to network at a high level with fellow professionals from across the water-related industries. We held two lunch events during the year at prestigious venues where key-note speakers sparked discussion and debate on contemporary issues in the built environment.

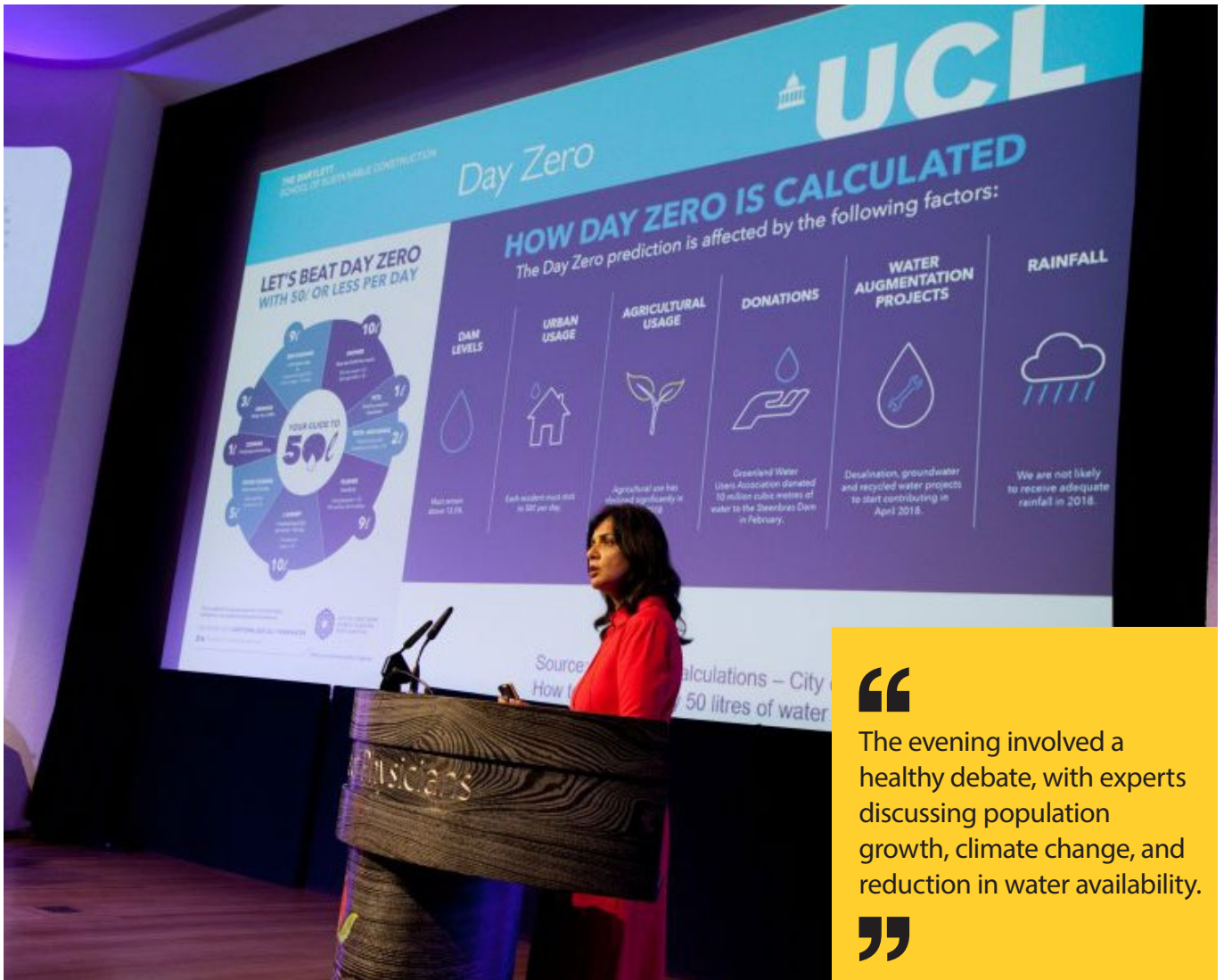

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The evening involved a healthy debate, with experts discussing population growth, climate change, and reduction in water availability.
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37th Annual Company Lecture — The Jaws of Death

The Company’s annual lecture for 2022 was held at the Royal College of Physicians in London on Monday 16th May.

Aiming to stimulate forward-thinking discussion surrounding industry best practice, conversations at this year’s gathering focused on the prediction that London will need one-third more drinking water by 2050.

Titled ‘The Jaws of Death’, the lecture concentrated on London’s increasing demand for water vs nature’s rapidly reducing supply. The evening involved a healthy debate, with experts discussing population growth, climate change, and reduction in water availability — based on current predictions estimating a significant increase in drinking

water requirements in the next 30 years. Potential solutions that were tabled included: new reservoirs, transfer of water between regions, water reuse, desalination, and improved catchment solutions.

Speaking on the issue, Dr Chris Lambert, Senior Technical Advisor to Thames Water, and Dr Priti Parikh, Associate Professor at the Bartlett School of Sustainable Construction, both delivered thought provoking presentations.

Developing plans to keep London’s water supply functioning through 2050, Dr Lambert is responsible for developing Thames Water’s long-term investment strategies for water supply demand planning. This includes the company’s Water Resources Management

Plan, Drought Plan and input to Water Resources South East regional plan.

Recently recognised by Apolitical as one of the 100 most influential academics for government policy, Dr Parikh focused on global water challenges and raise important questions. She is founder director of UCL’s Engineering for International Development Centre which carries out research into water-sanitation-energy solutions and has industry experience of design and delivery of infrastructure in South Asia, Sub-Saharan Africa and the UK.

The lecture concluded with a drink’s reception and dinner, which saw conversation surrounding this increasingly pressing issue continue until late in the evening.

the Installer Show at the NEC in June. In making the presentations, the Master, Nick Jones, and Richard Soper CBE, Chair of the Company's Education and Technical Committee, were both delighted and proud to pass on personal thanks for everyone's outstanding achievements.

Having negotiated three periods of national lockdown, the plumbing and heating industry has continued to support local communities throughout difficult times, protecting vulnerable individuals in the process. By launching the Certificate of Excellence scheme, the Company is proud to be able to acknowledge, take a moment to

reflect and recognise the tremendous effort made by so many students, apprentices and professional installers during this time.

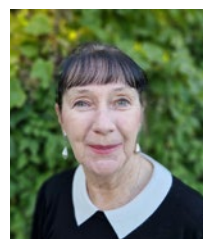
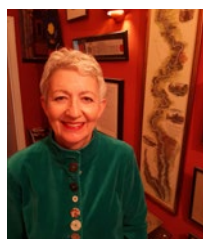

Women in Livery

Have you considered how many women are members of the Company? The answer is around 10% up by 3% from last year. The Women in the Livery team (WIL) focus was on promoting recruitment of women and encouraging their positive portrayal.

WIL created a recruitment video to aid members in describing the Company. A diverse group of members convey the benefits and fun joining brings. It is suitable for loop showing at conferences and events and the link can be downloaded for use on mobiles, LinkedIn/social media.
